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BUDGET DEFICIT DEFINES LEGISLATIVE SESSION

THE FIRST SESSION OF THE 55TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE **BEGAN** February 2nd and adjourned May 22nd, a week earlier than mandated by law. The largest budget deficit in recent years-\$611 million-garnered most of the headlines during the four months lawmakers spent at the state Capitol. While the final FY-16 budget did reduce ODOT's budget along with a funding impact to the County Improvements for Roads and Bridges (CIRB) Fund and the Weigh Station Revolving Fund, the ongoing ODOT eight-year highway and bridge construction plan is continuing uninterrupted. Due to the eightyear plan, steady progress continues in reducing the amount of structurally-deficient state bridges to less than 1% by the end of the decade. This progress has allowed ODOT officials to begin incorporating more highway pavement and widening projects into the eight-year plan which currently runs through 2023.

The 2015 legislative session was extremely challenging due to the budget deficit. Every area of government, whether core or non-core, was subject to intense scrutiny, and the preliminary outlook for the FY-17 budget is that another large deficit will greet legislators when they return to the Capitol February 1st. One of the prime selling points for funding transportation as a core priority is the tangible evi-

dence of progress whether on the state, county or municipal level. It is hard to ignore orange safety barrels, detours and road graders. In order for this collective progress to continue, TRUST members and all transportation advocates must be vigilant in advocating—as has been done since 2006—for sufficient funding in order to create a modern, safe and efficient transportation infrastructure system throughout Oklahoma. Legislative sessions are like human beings in that no two are alike. Over the past nine years, TRUST has aided in the creation of an environment that has returned transportation as a core priority of state government, and the results are evident across Oklahoma. 2016 will bring a new legislative session, a new budget, elections and its own unique set of challenges and opportunities to improve Oklahoma's infrastructure on many levels. TRUST must always stand ready to protect our mission.

In Washington, D.C., Congress is close to a resolution on a long-term surface transportation funding bill. This summer Oklahoma Senator Jim Inhofe, chairman of the Senate Environment & Public Works Committee, and a bipartisan collection of senators, co-sponsored a six-year bill entitled the DRIVE Act. The DRIVE Act was passed by the Senate just prior to the Highway Trust Fund (HTF) reaching insolvency July 31st. Since that time


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
two short-term HTF funding extensions were passed through late December. The House passed its own six-year bill entitled the Surface Transportation Reauthorization & Reform Act of 2015 in late October afterwards which Senate and House leaders proceeded to a joint conference committee where a final singular long-term bill was scheduled to be sent to President Obama prior to the December congressional recess. While no Oklahoma projects have been impacted due to the series of shortterm funding extensions, circumstances could change if reimbursement funds are not available, resulting in halting current or delaying new projects on the eight-year highway and bridge construction plan.

Oklahoma is very fortunate to have Senator Inhofe leading the charge for passage of a long-term bill. At the state Capitol, we are equally fortunate to have strong transportation advocates in Governor Mary Fallin, Senate President Pro Tempore Brian Bingman, House Speaker Jeff Hickman and dozens of Senate and House members. Oklahoma's transportation infrastructure is positioned well for the future, however to continue to make necessary progress, TRUST and its partners must never stop looking for ways to create a modern, first-class and safe infrastructure system across each level of government. Our mission must always be advocating such a system through the state legislature, governor and congressional delegation in order for transportation investment to remain a top priority in Oklahoma City and Washington, D.C.

FACED WITH THE LARGEST BUDGET DEFI-CIT (\$611 MILLION) IN MANY YEARS, the final

FY-16 budget agreement between Governor Fallin and legislative leaders impacted virtually every entity of state government including transportation. The total FY-16 ODOT appropriation represents a 6.25% reduction or approximately \$12.3 million less than FY-15 with no reduction to the current eight-year highway and bridge construction plan. The budget, however, did cap the CIRB fund at \$120 million annually and removed \$17.5 million from the Weigh Station Revolving Fund in order to shore up the overall deficit, both of which TRUST adamantly opposed.

Protecting the eight-year highway and bridge construction plan equates to an annual increase of \$59.7 million to the ROADS Fund until the total increase in the program equals \$575 million in FY-18. Furthermore, since the inception of TRUST in 2006, the amount of motor vehicle fees redirected from the General Revenue Fund towards transportation programs has significantly increased to where the County Improvements for Roads and Bridges (CIRB) Fund now receives 20% of motor vehicle fees.

As of the end of 2014, 376 of the nearly 6,800 bridges on the state highway system were classified as structurally-deficient, down from a high of 1,168 in 2004. Nearly all of the 376 bridges are scheduled to be replaced or rehabilitated in the next five years providing ODOT with the opportunity to focus on asset preservation, resurfacing, shoulder and other critical projects moving forward.

The luncheon also included presentation of the 2015 TRUST Guardian of Transportation award to Senator Inhofe who joins Oklahoma Secretary of Transportation and former ODOT and Oklahoma Turnpike Authority director Gary Ridley, former Governor George Nigh, former state representative Mark Liotta and TRUST co-founder Tom Love as recipients of the prestigious annual award.
